1.	<i>COMPARISON, INTERSTATE COOPERATION AND INTEGRATION BETWEEN LEGAL SYSTEMS</i>	<p><i>The curriculum aims to deepen understanding of the comparative method, the study of the classification of individual legal systems into systems and families, and the institutions of comparative law.</i></p> <p><i>A fundamental role is played by the training of scholars, who must be able to understand legal systems, legal families and the main characteristics of legal systems belonging to common law systems, demonstrating knowledge of the value and influence of the individual components of these systems. An understanding of the elements of convergence between legal systems is considered necessary in order to apply knowledge of the legal institutions and jurisprudential trends under study to the analysis of different constitutional experiences. The projection of legal systems, in the light of an awareness of the transnational dimension of contemporary issues, requires interconnected solutions structured on relations between States.</i></p>
2.	<i>PERSONAL, BUSINESS AND PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION</i>	<p><i>The curriculum aims to provide a comprehensive overview of the legal aspects of personal protection, combining the study of traditional and emerging issues in relations between individuals and legal entities. The curriculum aims to explore the new transformations of public entities against the backdrop of issues related to the digital and ecological transition. It also aims to analyse the economic and legal aspects of businesses, as well as to review the new subjectivities emerging within comparative law and the new collective actors, both public and private.</i></p>
